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Procession takes “agile” a stage further

Agile is an initiative by the industry to try and improve the application development cycle of software for business. It is a methodology and clearly will drive future application development. It has emerged from recognition for better more dynamic link by traditional technical developers to the requirements of the business. It was recognised it made sense to engage the end user to ensure the embedded business processes belong to them. The current dictatorial approach by either vendors or their powerful ecosystems or the outdated approach to procurement is doomed to see the shocking rate of IT failures continue.

However there is the stage beyond agile as a methodology to software technology that is agile. This capability exists in Procession's software technology and will effectively eliminate software failure. The core code never changes with no code generation or compiling. It allows great flexibility both in build and subsequent change ensuring any investment is future proof.

Procession's technology is so flexible it even changes the initial specification to a much slimmer exercise in so much that it is not necessary to be complete as build is iterative with change now an expected requirement. The build is remains under control of the business analyst working with users removing any interpretation gap.

This agile software is a game changing step in the evolution of business software. An example a recent UK Government contract sent offshore to build at £50m changes into a max £5m build locally. A consequence of Procession “agile” software is there no need to consider offshore application development.

This new technology offering agile software, pioneered by Procession, will allow focus on better use of specialist business consultants and remove reliance non contributing senior managers and procurement people. With so many vested interests this is the real challenge as is the buyer needing to become more informed of innovative technologies. But the old game is up as there are too many people now demanding change.
